### Recently Our Court cover was constructed, Macey, Harry & Hunter questioned Mr Cua, This is what he had to say



Kookaburras are birds, that have a white, fluffy head, with a brown stripe running through the eyes. Their wings and tail are mostly brown, with white and grey flecks on the feathers. Kookaburras have a sharp black and brown beak, and feet. These birds live in families until they are old enough to look after them selves on their own. Kookaburras are highly social, and like to live in groups.

#### HABITAT AND DIET

Kookaburras live in Australia, where the Eucalyptus trees grow. They prefer any area with trees big enough to contain their nests and open patches, good for hunting. Kookaburras live on snakes, lizards, small mammals, frogs, rodents, bugs, beetles and worms. Kookaburras are predators.

#### FUN FACTS AND UNIQUE FEATURES

- Kookaburras can eat venomous
- snakes!
- A kookaburra pair stays together for life.
- They live in close-knit family groups.

Kookaburras are know for their distinctive laugh, which is used to signal other kookaburras that this is their territory. These birds are the largest Kingfishers in the world!

The kookaburras laughter-like call is believed to signal the coming of rain. These creatures are believed to be a sacred and powerful creature, that is often associated with creation stories and spiritual beliefs.









